Things to do beforehand

Talk and discuss with family and friends.

Talk and discuss with everybody about your designated evacuation areas and ways on how to contact each other.

Make the interior of the house Secure and Safe

 Stabilize all the furnitures and household appliances in your home to prevent from falling.
Do not put objects in the passages, entrances or exits.

Prepare the emegency supplies in the event of an Emergency Evacuation.

Check the designated evacuation area and make a map near your house.

Evacuation centers are schools, community center and civic centers.

What is an earthquake?

Japan is a country with numerous earthquakes.

Nobody knows when and where will an earthquake occurs.

Aftershocks may occur after an earthquake.

The water, electricity and gas supplies might be cut off.

A tsunami might occur especially in places near the seashores.

The ground may shake so hard that houses and buildings might be damaged.

Even if there's an earthquake stay calm.



In Japan, the scale of the shake is represented by a number.

	[Seismic intensity 0] People don't feel the shaking.	[Seismic intensity 5 Lower] Most people try to be safe. Some people find it difficult to move.
?.	[Seismic intensity 1] Some people inside the room or building feel it.	[Seismic intensity 5 Upper] Most people are extremely frightened and find it hard to move.
	[Seismic intensity 2] Many people inside the room or building feel it. Some people who are sleeping will be awaken.	[Seismic intensity 6 Lower] Difficult to stand.
((((((((((((((((((([Seismic intensity 3 Felt by most people inside the room or building. Some people are frightened.	[Seismic intensity 6 Upper] Unable to stand and cannot move without crawling.
	[Seismic intensity 4] There is considerable sense of fear. Some people try to be safe. Most people who are sleeping will be awaken.	[Seismic intensity 7] Thrown around by the shaking and unable to move as you like.

When an Earthquake occurs

Inside the room

Stay away from bookshelves and windows, and hide under the table.



Open the door and secure a way out.



During evacuation, bring the Emergency supplies.

Inside the shop

Follow the instructions of the store clerk.



After the shaking subsides, turn off the fire.



Put on shoes to prevent injury.



Confirm the safety of your surroundings first before going out.



In an elevator

If the elevator does not stop automatically, press the buttons for every floor and get off as soon as the door opens.



On a train or bus

Follow the instructions of the staff, and refrain from rushing out of the door.



Near the Sea

A tsunami might occur, run away to a high place away from the sea. When driving a vehicle

Pull over the car on the left side of the road and stop the engine.

Leave the key in the ignition and evacuate.



Evacuate to a safe place as a mountain or a cliff may collapse.







Buildings might be broken and things will fall so stay away from it.



About the Heavy Rain and Typhoon

What is Heavy Rain, Typhoon?

Heavy Rains

Heavy Rains mean more rain will fall than usual.

Heavy rains occur during the rainy season (June to July) and during typhoons.

The water level of the rivers may rise and overflow.

Roads may overflood with water and it may enter the houses.

The cliffs may collapse.

Typhoon

Typhoons mostly occur from July to September.

It will rain heavily and strong winds will occur.

The water level of the rivers may rise and overflow.

The sea may be rough and the waves will rise.

The operations of trains, buses, and subways may stop.

The billboards and roof tiles may be blown away because of the strong winds.

* Heavy rains and typhoons can be predicted. Make it a habit to always check the internet and the television for the latest weather news updates.



When Heavy Rain or Typhoon occurs

Always check the television and internet for the latest news.

Prepare the Outside of the House Secure everything that might be blown away. Shut all the windows and shutters.

Prepare the necessary things in case of Evacuation.

Stay away from dangerous places.

Dangerous places may include rivers, seashores and mountain slopes.

Landslides may occur.

Heavy rains and Typhoon may cause the soil to soften.

Cliffs may collapse.

People living in houses near cliffs should evacuate immediately.

Warning Levels and Proper Actions to Take

Warning Level	Actions to Take
1	Heavry rains might occur. Check the latest news carefully through the television and internet.
2	Prepare to evacuate. Check the hazard map.
Ş	Healthy and able persons prepare for evacuation. Elderly and expectant mothers should evacuate.
4	Everyone should evacuate to a safe place.
5	Life is in danger. Take measures to protect life.





When a fire occurs



1.Let the people around you know by shouting [KAJI DA] (there's a fire). **Residential Fire Alarm** A device that produces a loud noise when it detects smoke and heat. 2.Contact the fire department by dialing 119. (free of charge) How to contact 119 ① Dial 119 and clearly say [kaji desul "Fire" 2 Tell the location . OO ward, OO block . the house number OO mansion, next to the OO community center. [OOku OOchoume Ooban, OOgo; OO mansion, OO no tonari desul ③ 00 is burning. [00 ga moeteimasu]. ④ My name is. [Watashi no namae wa OO desu]. My phone number is. [Denwa bangou wa 000-0000 desu]. 3.Put out the fire with fire extinguisher or water. If you don't have a fire extinguisher, put out the fire by beating it with a cushion or by covering the

flames with a wet towel or blanket.

Never water the pans that has oil in it, kerosene stoves and electrical appliances.





4. Evacuate immediately when you fail to extinguish the fire.

Make sure not to inhale the smoke from the fire when evacuating.

The smoke from the fire contains hazardous chemicals or gas.
Cover your mouth and nose with a wet towel or wet handkerchief. Posture yourself low and evacuate.
Always use the stairs when evacuating from tall buildings (mansions and department stores). Never use the elevators,

5. You must not go back once your already outside.

Do not leave anything that easily catches fire around the house.



When you leave the kitchen, turn off the fire.



After smoking a cigarette, extinguish it properly.

Do not connect a lot of electrical appliances to one outlet.





Do not leave things that easily catches fire near the stove.



Do not place matches or lighters where children can reach them.



Fill it up by yourself and bring it with you.
